British Chemical Company's Trenton explosives plant-an industry which only lasted in the area four years He says he wanted to make the historical fact interesting because it is.



3. "Belleville native's work has come home." This was the recent heading in The Intelligencer's review of the newest exhibition at the Hastings County Museum. Penny Gordon's review highlighted the artistic career of Aileen Cherry, who began her formal training at St. Agnes Manor Girls' School. More than forty of her paintings, including several of the Belleville and Quinte area, are on display at the Museum until February 19. Curator Mary Simonds reports that attendance and interest in the display have been high.

4. Members and friends of the Society will be interested in this report (February 12) of our Building Restoration Committee: Don Kellaway, chairman, and Gregg Gordon.

"Belleville City Council and the Moira River Conservation Authority have now both agreed in principle to permit the Hastings County Historical Society to use the Old Stone Building on Station Street (commonly referred to as Meyer's Mill) for their offices and headquarters. Construction work, being paid for by a federal grant, is currently underway to prepare the building's interior for this use; however, additional funds will be required to complete exterior restoration, provide services, and finish renovations on the interior. Assistance is being sought from Provincial sources. In addition, a request has been made to City Council for a grant equal to the amount saved by the City when the original demolition contract was cancelled. Volunteers will be required for specific tasks such as electrical and mechanical installation work. With a lot of support, we could be moved in by the end of this year.

"We anticipate that the space will provide areas for executive, annual, and general meetings & an office/kitchen and washroom, fully accessible for the handicapped. The ground floor will be kept for research areas and display, while the top floor will be maintained

for storage and workshop space.

"Groundwork for this current construction was prepared with assistance from Loyalist College. Two students from the Women in a Non Traditional Work Force program made minor repairs to the interior during the latter part of November last, under the direction of Mr. Doug Preston and Mr. Wilf Sager. Mrs. Pat Bennett presently is assisting the committee in taking care of our accounts, and Mr. Bob Brennan has offered his expertise in construction on a regular basis. Our thanks to all of you for your donations of time and energy, and those, not listed, for your financial contributions and words of encouragement."

And our thanks to Don and Gregg for their continuing leadership on this project!
