ELDORADO: ONTARIO'S FIRST GOLD RUSH. Ninety-one people gathered to show their support for a past president and to recognize Gerry's achievements as a researcher, author, and supporter of community activities.

Following his introduction by president Bernard Wright, Gerry explained his reasons for writing about this topic. He also outlined some of the changes that came about in this Moira River area of Eldorado as a result of the influx of people to work in the mines who had hoped to 'strike it rich'. In fact, Hastings County officials organized the first mounted police force in Canada in 1867 to maintain law and order in the Marmora-Eldorado area.

Using 33mm slides Gerry showed some of the book's illustrations of original buildings, topography and personnel from those early mining days.

Retired educator Wanda Sine presented a gift along with very kind words of appreciation to Gery. In addition he also received a 'Good Citizen's Award' to acknowledge his interest in preserving local history. Congratulations were personally accorded to Gerry by Belleville Mayor Shirley Langer, County Warden Owen Ketcheson, Madoc Township Reeve Gerald Reid, resident geologist Paul Kingston (Ontario Ministry of Northern Development and Mines), publisher Barry Penhale and Ontario Historical Society president Dennis Carter-Edwards.

Searching For Mr. Lincoln's Canadians By Lewis Zandbergen

Although experts say the numbers vary between a low of 40,000 and a high of 100,000, the indisputable fact remains - Canadians (actually British North Americans; Confederation and the Dominion of Canada did not become a reality until July 1, 1867) did serve in the ranks of both Union (north) and Confederate (South) armies during the American Civil War (1861-1865).

Even cursory research reveals that Hastings County Citizens of the 1860s headed south of the border between 1861 and 1865. Not all returned. Some stayed after the war and settled in the rapidly expanding United Stares. Some, like brothers John and Peter Stringer of Bancroft, were killed in action and lie buried beneath American soil. Twenty-eight Canadians were awarded the Medal of Honour for gallantry. William Perry, of Roblin, served with union forces, was wounded and sent home. He died several months later.

Among Canadians who served the Union were two brothers from Sidney Township - Daniel and Doctor William Fraser. The Fraser brothers were grandsons of Sylvester Faulkner who was himself and expatriate American. Sylvester and his wife, Mary, arrived in Sidney sometime during the early 1810s. They settled first near Frankford on Concession 3 and then moved to Lot 33, Concession 8, Their eldest daughter, Adaline, married a Mr. Fraser and bore William and Daniel. In retrospect, it may have been Sylvester's tales of his Massachusetts boyhood which spurred the brothers to their decision to marry and eventually settle in the U.S. Doctor william Fraser was engaged in a practice in Chicago and Daniel settled in Kansas; it isn't clear what his occupation was.

In war, however, they both served the Union cause. William was a surgeon under General William Tecumseh Sherman and participated in Sherman's 'March to the sea'. Daniel also served the Union but his rank and area of service are not known. Both men lived out their lives in the United States.

The story of Canadian who fought in the American Civil War has often been glossed over, indeed little has been written about this side of the 'War between the States'. FOUR WENT TO THE CIVIL WAR by Lois Darroch is one exception.

POW REPORTS MISSING ARTIFACTS

PRESERVE OUR WRECKS Kingston Limited (POW) is aware of the disappearance of several artifacts from historic dive sites in eastern Lake Ontario. The dredge MUNSON, and schooners GEORGE A. MARSH and OLIVE BRANCH are known to be missing items. POW has an artifact inventory on only two of the fifteen wrecks we moor for SCUBA diving. This will change in the coming year with a project to video and manually record all artifacts on each of our wrecks. Thousands of divers enjoy these wrecks annually, not just to dive, but also to admire our beautiful shipwrecks. All responsible divers would like to see these wrecks remain attractive and not become barren hulls.

There appear to be a few who think that an item removed here or there will not be noticed. POW will make it known through diving publications that items are indeed being stolen and hopefully stop thefts by making this practice unacceptable throughout the diving community.

All of our historic dive sites are considered property of the Province of Ontario and are protected by the Ontario Heritage Act. Removing any item from shipwrecks is a provincial offence. Fines vary from several hundred dollars to imprisonment, and equipment used during the offence can be seized. The Ontario Provincial Police, Marine Unit, have acted on at least one occasion in this area when a theft was suspected.

Most SCUBA divers realize that they are fortunate to be able to dive and actually touch history as if they were in an underwater museum. Shipwreck dive sites require respect and tender loving care from all who are able to visit and admire them.

The Special Exhibit BELLEVILLE'S MARINE HER-ITAGE' at the Hastings County Museum will continue throughout 1993. The exhibit focuses on the dredge MUNSON - its essential activities in Belleville Harbour during the 1880s, and its unexpected sinking in local waters in 1890. Highlights of the display include underwater photographs of the MUN-SON in her watery grave and marine artifacts recovered from the wreck. The artifacts on display are part of the collection of the Hastings County Museum and were recovered for the purposes of protection and preservation.
