# May Meeting

n Tuesday May 17, 1994 members of the Hasting County Historical Society and a large number of visitors met at the Quinte Living Centre. President Leona Hendry announced that the Ontario Historical Society had presented the Cruikshank Gold Medal to Gerry Boyce following nomination by our society.

Tuesday's meeting was held in conjunction with St. Thomas' Anglican Church on the occasion of their 175 anniversary. The first guest speaker, Dr, Shelley Saunders, was introduced by Carol Ladoucier, Dr. Saun-

ders is professor of anthropology at MacMaster University. When the addition was built on St. Thjomas' it was evident irt must be built on the old graveyard. It was decided that before the bodies were reburied the graveyard should be investigated through an archeological dig.

Shelley describes herself as a physical anthropologist whose job is skeletal analysis to reconstruct the past from skeletal remains. She began her her presentation with the question "What can we learn of the styles of life styles in the mid 19th century from biological remains?" Using slides of graphs she explained what had been learned from the St. Thomas' sample - 286 children and 271 adults, a total of 557. Since there were burial records for 1318 people this was considered a good representation. Eighty individuals could be identified. She showed slides of a fractured skull thought to be suffered in an accident, a thigh bone with multiple fractures and several dental slides. Analysis revealed there was a high incidence of cavities in adults as well as periodontal disease. It is known that dentists trained in Europe were practising in Belleville at the time.

In some cases copper coffin plates with inscriptions were found so skeletons could be identified. Stature could be measured with the average male measuring 5'8" and the female 5'3". Analysis is getting more sophisticated. It is now possible to extract DNA as has been from small samples of bone tissues from the St. Thomas sample.

Dr. Saunders' colleague, Larry Sawchuk has community structure as his interest. For the past two years he has been learning about Belleville and the Anglican community. His graphs illustrated medical anthropology in th year 1861, 1871 and 1881. The 1861 census indicated that the Belleville Anglican community was growing 2 percent every year. By 1881 the Anglican population was expanding with a rapid birth rate and a lot of immigration. Presbyterians and Anglicans were the wealthiest segment of the population. The big killer of adults was TB, while babies often died of pollution in their food when they stopped breast feeding. A lively question period followed the presentations.

# JUNE MEETING

group of interested members of the Hastings
County Historical Society gathered at the Quinte
Living Centre on June 16, 1994 to receive a fascinating glimpse of Quinte life in the mid 1800's.

Ted Fraser, Director of the Confederation Centre of Arts in Charlottetown gave an illustrated presentation on the life and work of George Ackermann, especially as it related to the Quinte area. Ackermann, who lived from 1801 to 1891. worked mostly in watercolour. His painting of the old Court House on Pinnacle Street hangs in the Canadiana Room of the Corby Library.

George Ackermann grew up in London, England, the son of Rudolph Ackermann who published fine art prints. During his early years he met some of the best artists of the day.

He went to Guatemala in 1829 and there met his future wife while climbing a volcano. He later took over the family business in 1834 but was forced to liquidate in 1885.

Eventually George Ackermann came to Canada and lived in the Quinte area from 1863 to 1876, settling first in Madoc. He taught art in various settings including what was the Ontario School for the Deaf. In 1876 he moved to Prince Edward Island settling in Summerside.

Ted Fraser explained that he is now preparing an exhibition of Ackermann's work, most of which was discovered in Western Canada three years ago. Many of the paintings were rolled up and the smaller paintings of wild flowers stuffed in shoeboxes. He hopes the exhibition will tour nationally and even internationally.

The earliest slides of Ackermann's works showed paintings of Guatemala, painted when he was 19. After coming to Canada he began to paint wildflowers to document the plants of the new world. Exquisite in design, they have stayed hidden for over 100 years.

Each time he moved Ackermann painted the centre of the community. Thus we see "Mill and Creek -Madoc" painted in 1864. In 1869 he painted "Main Street Picton" a version of which hangs in the Metropolitan Library in Toronto. A painting of Belleville reveals Pinnacle Street looking south with the courthouse on the hill. This was painted c1870 and is still owned by the family. After moving to Prince Edward Island he painted Government House in Charlottetown. Two of the most fascinating and detailed pictures were of the artist's parlour and sitting room, painted in 1880. When Ackermann was 86 years old he moved to Chicago where his son practiced as an archi-

Ted Fraser will be going to London England for a week to talk with John Ford, an expert on the Ackermanns.



For Sale ... The Glen Miller Rock (also known as the Bleasdell Boulder, the Big Boulder, the Long Family Rock, or a geological erratic), a natural history landmark near Glen Miller in Sidney Township. This "colossal 1,000-tonne conglomerate of rock, crystal and dirt, shaped and rounded by glaciers" (to quote Derek Baldwin in The Trentonian) carried here from the Canadian Shield during the Ice Age. The boulder and surrounding acre are protected by provincial legislation. The site is an Area of Natural Scientific Interest (ANSI) and the rock can't legally be moved. The Long family has placed the rock and 71 acres of nature trails on the market. Interested in developing this potential tourist attraction? Contact Royal LePage of Trenton.

Also for sale, but cheaper and portable ... Titles Book Store in Belleville offers an unusual document: a typed, heavilyannotated report prepared for the CPR and CNR by Walter J. Francis in April, 1920, relating to that year's Belleville flood. The author concluded that the CPR bridge was "in no way responsible for the flood." The 54-page report has 25 photographs (identified and dated) of flood scenes as well as hand-coloured plans. It's a fascinating document that should be added to the Society' archives, if a donor (or donors) could be found.

"Museum Corner" is a regular feature in The Bancroft Times,

written by Rob Walker, Curator of the North Hastings Heritage Museum in Bancroft. The August 23 column dealt with the W.W.I. field surgical kit used by Dr. Alexander Thomas Embury, a doctor in North Hastings (1898-1935) who served in the war. Rob describes the tools (including two wellworn amputation saws and a cranial saw) as "varying in their gruesomeness." Nevertheless, they were state of the art 80 years ago and were similar to those found in Dr. Mungo Ponton's 19th century surgical kit, now in the Hastings County Museum in Belleville.



# George. Benjamin

### Returns To Belleville

After a length absence, Williams's Sawyer's portrait of George Benjamin MP, has returned ti its home at the Hastings County Museum. The portrait was part of a Canadian Museum of Civilization travelling exhibit "A Coat of Many Colours" which highlighted the historical contribution of Jews to Canada's development. The exhibit toured Canada, the United States and Israel.

George Benjamin (1799 - 1864) was born in Brighton England and was of Jewish ancestry. He travelled extensively and finally settled in Belleville, Upper Canada in 1834 with his wife and infant son. In Belleville he founded the Belleville Intelligencer and Hastings General Advertiser and becomes involved in the community and local politics. He served as the first Jewish Member of Parliament from 1857 - 1863.

George Benjamin's portrait belongs to the County of Hastings and is on display in the Library.
