Archives Relocation New Site Announced

After years of effort, it looks like our archives will have a new home!

It has been announced that the Irish Hall building at 315 Church Street, Belleville will become a new community archives operated by the Historical Society, City of Belleville and Hastings County. Arrangements are still underway but the Archives Relocation Committee and representatives from the three partners have all agreed that this site could be renovated to serve as a good home for their archives.

The property is situated on a bus route, has parking, and should be convenient for municipal staff and more volunteers and visitors. The


Loyalists Brought Methodism To Ontario

nature's canopy of sky and trees.

In 1820, under Wesleyan Methodism, the Episcopalean missionaries, who had a strong American background, were given responsibility for Upper Canada. In their early days they had little use for worldly possessions or education as it was felt these things were obstacles to man's communion with God. The Wesleyan missionaries, with their more British ties, took on responsibility for the movement's work in Lower Canada

and in Kingston, Ontario. As Jennifer Bunting, the Historical Society's April speaker explained, Kingston was considered just too British for Methodist Episcopaleans.

The Episcopaleans were denied the right to conduct marriages in Canada as it was thought all the records would flow back south of the border or even that no records would be kept as reading and writ-

Society has committed to raise funds for upgrading and equipping the building to provide a good environment for the archival materials and also comfortable space for our volunteer Archive Angels and visitors who want to look at the archival records.

The 5,500 square foot building is about the right size, and has an elevator to serve the two levels plus mezzanine. It is a solid construction of steel and concrete, and we believe the floors will withstand the heavy loads of records - typically 150 pounds per square foot or higher, or more than 250 pounds per square foot for mobile compact shelving. It should also meet other requirements, such as leak-proof roof, dry below grade areas, minimal infiltration of air, no windows in the records storage area, and no bats and mice!

One Horn Cow And Her Accomplice Still At Large!

Strayed from the premises of the subscriber about the 24th of September (1860) last, TWO COWS (both giving milk) one red, with a white spot on her forehead (three years old); the other red with white back, one horn broken off close to the head, and a bell about the neck.

Any person giving information where they may be found will be recompensed for his trouble. John J. Haslett, Hastings Chronicle, Belleville, October 30, 1860.

Further research into subsequent editions of the Hastings Chronicle gave no indication if the animals were found. Nor was any advertisement noted for the sale of two cows at a bargain price.

ing at that time were not Episcopalean strong points.

In 1828 the American Methodist Conference released their Canadian counterparts, permitting them to form their own Conference. By 1874, after over forty years of bickering and infighting between the two factions, the log cabin mentality was gone. During that period the growing importance of education was recognized and in the year 1857 the Episcopalean's founded Belleville's Albert College.

The Bay of Quinte area along with Napanee formed the

centrepiece of Episcopalean Methodist work and in 1874 Napanee hosted the Episcopalean Methodist Conference. Well over one hundred clergymen attended, many them Americans,

and as rooms were at a premium many of them boarded in the home of parishioners. A local newsto the effect that the

streets of Napanee were awash with men in black. One of the participants, Dr. Moses J. Hill, hoped to persuade the Canadian contingent to reunite with the American Conference. Another, Reverend Thomas Webster, was a lifelong and bitter foe of Weslevan Methodism. In 1926 it was the merger of the Presbyterian Church with the Methodists that became the United Church of Canada. Check online for extensive information on Methodism.
