Study Committee, under chairman Wray Main, was formed and devoted over two thousand hours of their time, talent and limitless energy in examining the recommendations and coming forward with some of their own. The students' own "B.C.I. Forever" committee and other groups of interested citizens also contributed their support.

I would also like to thank a bright and charming B.C.I. student, Jenny McNaughton. She is a


success at everything she does and I'd like to thank her for making this a very special year with her talents on the B.C.3. Sludy Committee.

Fellow graduates, as you walk out the doors of B.C.I. tonight, think about these words written by Wentworth:



Mexican Exchange Student


