Principal's Message

It is a pleasure to convey my most sincere thanks to Elevator editor Elizabeth McCoy, her staff and advisor Mrs. Clarke for another excellent yearbook. This has proved to be an eventful, exciting and stressful year for students and staff with many changes taking place and the question of B.C.I.'s survival being debated. Many situations have proved to be excellent learning experiences for all of us and with this in mind I have outlined below a few of the achievements and more challenging events of the past year.

A hard-working, imaginative Students' Council under the direction of president, Laura Main produced one of the best organized and most active programmes for students since I came to the school ten years ago.

The introduction of "adult-only" programmes - the work of a small group of teachers at B.C.I. - meant that for the first time a large number of adults joined our student body for adult business skills, physical education and many regular classes. It is hoped that this very successful innovation will be copied and improved upon throughout the country.

There was a need to look after the children of some mothers who wished to return to school so some staff members established the B.C.I. Child Care Centre in Room 307 at the start of the second semester. The "kids", from four months to five years old, were a hit with all who saw them and everyone (mothers, children, and students) benefited from the arrangement.

When B.C.I. was recommended for closure the B.C.I. Study Committee, under chairman Wray Main, was formed and devoted over two thousand hours of their time, talent and limitless energy in examining the recommendations and coming forward with some of their own. The students' own "B.C.I. Forever" committee and other groups of interested citizens also contributed their support.

Academically and athletically B.C.I. had an excellent year with many students earning honour standing and a number of teams having very successful seasons - a fine tribute to the efforts of the students and the staff members involved.

I like to think that these examples will show what small groups of people with a common goal and real inspiration and determination can do if they so desire. This is a good lesson to carry with you as you go through life.

I hope that B.C.I. has prepared you with the academic tools, the imagination and the spirit to successfully tackle the many new exciting and difficult challenges that the future holds for you.

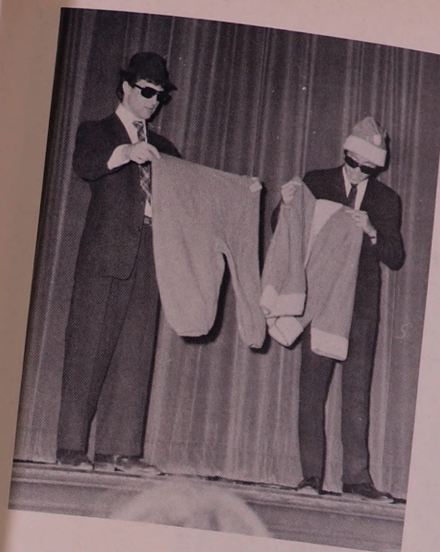
Christmas Formal

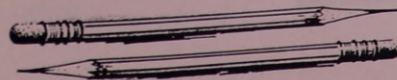
And what about the highest authority on the subject? Oh, the teachers haven't said a word, except maybe an occasional "NO".

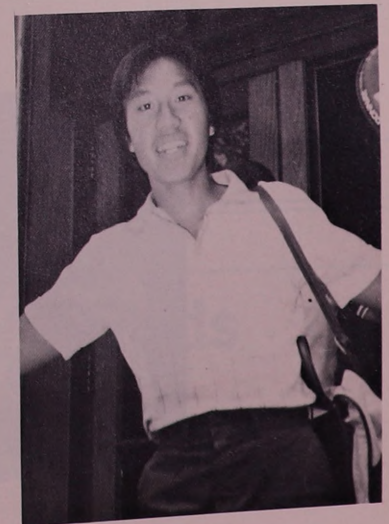

The Air Gods created summer to warm villages and grow crops. Winter is to kill off the villages' sickly and weak burdens who eat our food.

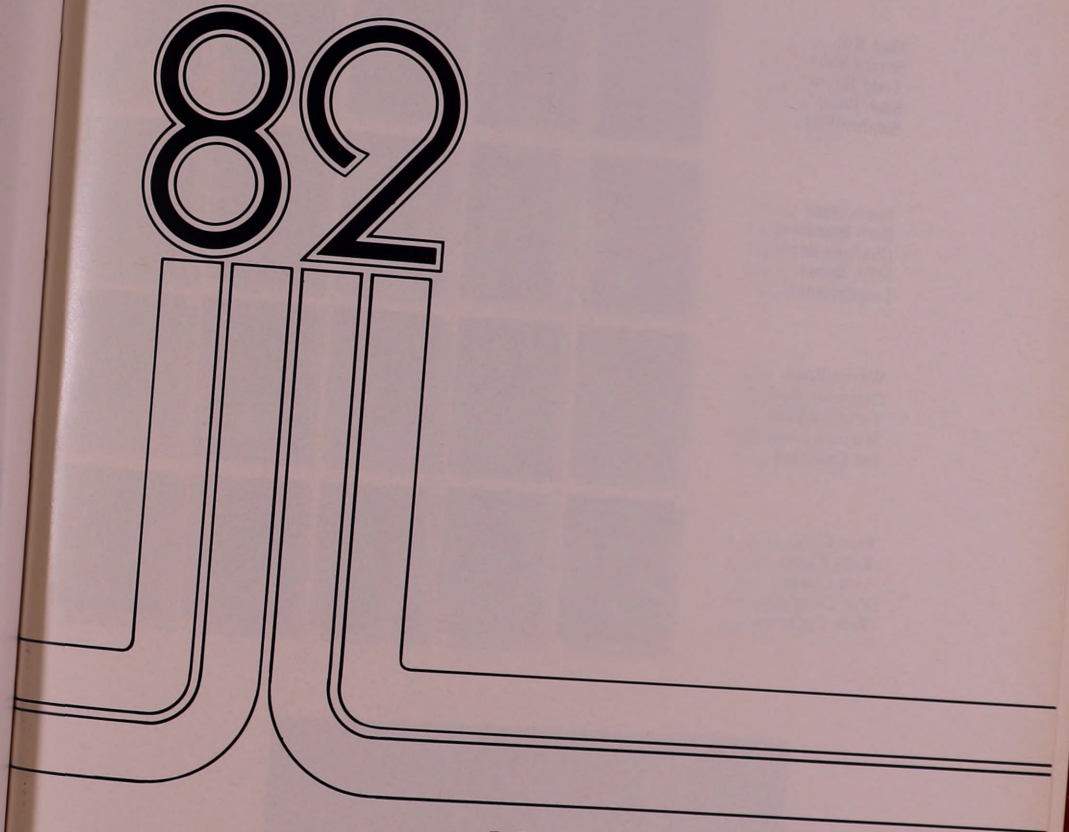
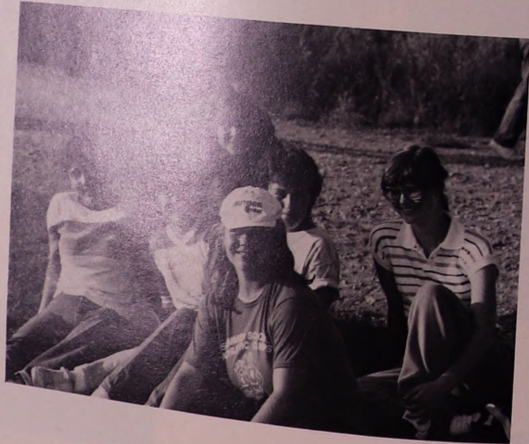
Lightning and thunder are the remains of the god's eternal battle. The clouds, stars, sun and moon are the Air-Gods' unreachable lands.

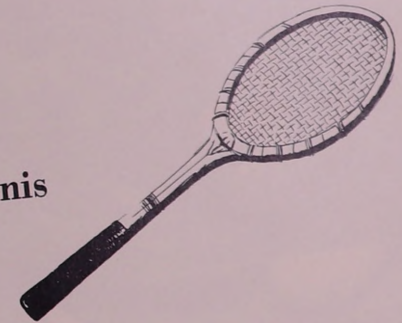


Curling
