Review of 2022

The Community Archives was closed to the public from January 5th to 30th due to a provincial lockdown. Since then, we have been open as usual. Once again our behind-the-scenes work was focused on digitizing local newspapers and assessment rolls and sharing them online. Our account at the Internet Archive at https://archive.org/details/cabhc now holds over 3,250 digitized items (up from 1,200 at the end of 2021).

Our summer student last year was Zac Miller, a Masters student from the University of Toronto, who was with us from May to August. Zac made good progress on digitizing our original copies of local nineteenth century newspapers, taking over 50,000 photographs in the process. These are now searchable online through the Internet Archive. These newspapers cover Belleville, Deseronto, Madoc and Stirling.
