With the land claim affecting Deseronto, Council was hoping to have a public meeting regarding developments. Unfortunately, there is little progress to report, and even the long-time assistant negotiator—the lead federal employee for this claim—has taken another position.

The federal minister of Indian and Northern Affairs, the Hon. Chuck Strahl, had to be corrected when, on the subject of compensation, he wrote that the quarry site is no longer occupied. In his counter reply he stated that if the site was occupied the police should be called. However, the O.P.P. have made it very clear that they do not believe it prudent to intervene. Minister Strahl also could not foresee when he would have time to meet with municipal officials. Additionally, both the federal and provincial governments have failed to offer compensation for suspicious and costly hay fires three years in a row, because no one was ever caught. The last fire occurred on a

hot, dry day when demand for water was high and water pressure was low. This, and an aging fire truck, were of concern, and have prompted the Town to acquire a new fire truck.

DAMAGED OR FALLING TREES ON NEIGHBOURING PROPERTIES

Recently the Town of Deseronto has received an increasing number of complaints regarding trees and branches from neighbouring properties falling or the danger of them falling on other resident's properties. Recognizing this as an issue for both property owners, Municipal staff would like to inform residents of expected actions when dealing with this concern.

First, it is important to maintain good relations with neighbours and if a tree on your property is creating a hazard to a neighbouring property, it is the property owner's responsibility that the tree sits on, to ensure a resolution to the hazard is made. In the event where a tree branch or whole tree falls on a neighbouring home, the property owner who "owns" the tree can be liable and if negligence is evident, the situation heightens. We recommend that all residents take this matter seriously to ensure the safety of all residents and to look after the trees and branches of trees within their property lines.

Secondly, if you know that a tree on your property needs to have dead portions trimmed as it is becoming a "dirty" tree, we ask that you take immediate action to alleviate any cause for concern. Having a tree trimmed can often diffuse the dangerous situation and possibly help the life of a damaged tree. This will also go a long way in reducing the amount of waste a neighbouring property may incur as a result of the deteriorating tree. The Municipality's involvement in these disputes is to lay out the responsibility

to the property owners involved and put the land owner of the tree on record in the case of a dangerous situation. In the event where a property owner chooses to take no action, a request can be made to have the Municipality arrange for the removal of the dangerous part of the tree for the purpose of "Public Health and Safety". Once this action is taken, the municipality will begin proceedings to receive cost retributions plus administrative costs.



It is important to note that this drastic step is an undesirable approach for the Municipality. We would like to encourage all residents to work towards a peaceful resolution, but will become involved when all other approaches have been exhausted or an immediate health or safety risk is brought to our attention.

WINTER PARKING

Please be advised that under By-Law 6-97 winter parking restrictions are in effect as follows: Section 25(5)

5

No person, shall on any highway, park any vehicle; between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 8:00 a.m. from December 1, 2009 to March 31, 2010

Section 40

No person shall park a vehicle in such a manner as to interfere with necessary civic services such as road repairing, snow ploughing or snow removal that already is in progress, nor park a vehicle at any place where authorized signs have been placed indicating any snow removal or other civic operations are to be commenced.

The registered owners of vehicles in violation of the winter parking restriction are subject to a fine up to a maximum of \$100.00




Deseronto Public School needs help to make our breakfast program run this year.

There is always a great need for volunteers to foster cats on a short term basis, or people to permanently adopt the animals. We do not euthanize, animals are spayed/neutered, and fostered by volunteers while they recuperate until they are adopted, such as pregnant mothers or mothers with newborns until the kittens can be weaned (about 8 weeks), adopted, and eventually spayed or neutered. Accommodation is particularly important at this time of year with cold weather. If you are concerned about an animal, please consider if you can foster it while we book a spay-neuter appointment (sometimes several days), it recuperates after the operation (a few days or 1.5 weeks), and a home can be found (or even whether you may be prepared to adopt it). We have no foster options at present, but

sometimes a spare bedroom, laundry or mud room, or other secure shelter space that is at least 50 degrees Fahrenheit is all that is required. Fixed Fur Life covers the cost of spay/neutering and vaccinations (plus boosters), has a small supply of food, and treatments for fleas, mites and worms. However, donations are always greatly appreciated with a tax receipt provided (even a small donation helps with spay/neutering as this costs Fixed Fur Life \$60. for males, \$85. for females, and often


