## Flora MacDonald: "The Power of One" at Work in Afghanistan



Flora MacDonald captivated a packed banquet hall at Belleville's Ramada Inn with stories of her humanitarian (and sometimes hazardous) work in Afghanistan. Since leaving government office in 1988 she has devoted herself to the cause of international human rights. Her foundation, *Future Generations Canada*, can be found online at www.futuregen.ca

In 2001, at the age where most of us would be relaxing in our retirement, Flora MacDonald made her first trip to Afghanistan. She's been back every year since and has visited nearly almost all of the 34 provinces in the country, from the lush valleys lying in the shadow of the Himalayas in the north to the desert country around Kabul in the south. It is a country with over three thousand years of history, a complex part of the world where its people attach great emphasis on their right to the land.

Flora's humanitarian work focuses on things like health, cleanliness, child care, and education. Women with children will walk for miles in the winter to go to school. Standard items in her travel bag are pens, crayons, notebooks and paper. Education is so valued that everyone, even the very young, are expected to pass on what they have learned. Chairs and desks for students can be luxuries.

Her work includes providing basic food items like grain, salt, cooking oil and sugar to a population where the average lifespan of a woman is 47 years and a man 49 years. One of the early projects was to get seeds to the people so they could grow their own vegetables. Sewing machines were made available and sewing classes are very popular. Women were given roosters and chickens to provide eggs in their family diet, something they had not

known before. Flora even talked an expatriate Afghani who was manager of a number of Ontario pizza stores to return to Afghanistan to help his people.

Flora travels around the country in a small truck with her driver and guide, Abdullah. The roads are rough and on one occasion during a night time excursion they were stopped by a band of men who beat up the driver and robbed the two other passengers of their belongings. She was not harmed, she said, possibly because of her age and being in a country where age is venerated.

As wood is the only fuel available to most people tree planting is important. They have planted 980,000 trees since she started her work there. Her yearly opera-

tional costs plus salary for her driver amount to \$75,000. The money comes from speaking engagements and donations. Flora MacDonald is the embodiment of how one person can make a positive difference in the lives of many.
