#### RULES AND REGULATIONS

#### Read carefully before making entries

1. The payment of \$1.00 shall constitute a member for 1913, who will receive a member's pass with their name written thereon, good during the Fair. Parties who have not paid the regular fee on or before the 29th day of August will be charged the sum of Two Dollars for membership.

2. Entry Books will be open for Fall Exhibition from Aug. 15 to Aug. 29 inclusive when the books will be closed and no entries will be taken after that time on any consideration whatever, and no articles will be taken into the halls after 12 o'clock noon on the first day. This ru e will be rigidly enforced and all members and those intending are requested to pay particular attention thereto. Members sending entries by mail will have tickets returned or delivered at the grounds the first morning of the Fair. Judges for the Halls will be called promptly at 9 a.m. on the 2nd day, September 2nd.

3. All animals and articles intended for exhibition must be on the grounds by 12 o'clock noon, Monday, September 1st. Judging of stock,

etc., to begin at 9 a.m., Tuesday, September 2nd.

4. All exhibits must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor, and the exhibitor will be required to produce satisfactory registration papers with all registered stock that he may have on exhibition, to the Judge at the time of the exhibition. Persons violating this rule will forfeit all prizes that may be awarded them.

5. No bull will be allowed on the show grounds unless secured by a chain or pen. No Prize will be allowed unless article is considered wor-

thy, even if there is no other entry in the same class.

6. No cattle allowed on Show Grounds unless on exhibition,

7. Exhibitors will be required to bring forward their stock when called for by the Judges, as no animals will be judged unless so brought forward, and pedigrees must be produced to the satisfaction of the Judges.

- 8. No animal or article exhibited will be allowed to be removed from the grounds of buildings before 5 o'clock p.m. on Tuesday, September 2nd under penalty of losing the premium, unless by permission of the President.
- 9. The Society reserves the right to reduce the amount offered in prizes, if necessary, to meet any exigences that may arise.

10. The Association reserves the right to deduct 50 per cent. of the

prize money (on stock only) where there is only one competitor.

11. Any person attempting to impose upon the judges by giving certificates of stock or other articles that are not strictly correct, or in any way interfering with the judges in the discharge of their duties shall be disqualified from receiving any premium money.

12. No person shall be allowed to enter for exhibition more than one specimen in any section. This rule does not apply to animals or fowls.

13. If any person wilfully injures or destroys any property within the Exhibition Grounds of the Association, or hinders or obstructs the officers or servants of the said Association, or any policeman or constable duly appointed in the execution of his duty, or gains admission to the grounds contrary to the rules of the Association, he shall be liable to a fine, said fine to be enforced and collected as fines are usually collected.

14. Each member taking any prize must leave \$1.00 with the Treas-

urer for membership for 1914.

15. No tents or booths for the sale of intoxicating liquors will be allowed within or near the show grounds.

16. Manufacturers or agents of all implements, machinery or musical instruments not enumerated shall have the liberty to exhibit on the grounds and in the hall of the Society by becoming members.

17. Parties aggrieved must notify the Secretary, in writing of such

complaint previous to 5 p.m. on Tuesday, September 2nd.

18. Members are requested to pay strict attention to all rules, as they will be adhered to by the officers of the Society.

19. On September 6 at 1 o'clock p.m. a meeting of the directors will be held at the Secretary's office, Front Street, Belleville, to adjust all complaints, if any.

20. Any premium not called for before December 31, 1913, will be for-

feited to the Society.

21. While the directors will take every possible precaution under the circumstances to secure the safety of articles sent to the exhibition, the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting, and should any article be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, the directors will give all the assistance in their power towards the recovery, but they will not make any payment for the value thereof.






