
This year of think the title pages are especially good. I had three excellent artists working on them and I owe them many thanks. Many people learned


























GRAD STATS

A Tribute - Miss Catherine Kelly


In paying tribute to Miss Kelly, a writer is paying tribute to a teacher whose strong convictions are blended with a gentle nature, whose high personal standards are balanced against a warm tolerance of others', whose keen intellect is mellowed by kindly perceptiveness, and whose fierce pride and loyalor are tempered by patient understanding.

Twenty-three years ago a young lady arrived on the staff of B.C.I.V.S. to take charge of its library and teach some history courses. Both areas were her "first loves": she had taught history along with other subjects, in days of Continuation Schools and subsequently moved into library work in the Public Libraries of Sarnia and Belleville. But it was here at B.C.I. that the two interests came together in a way most beneficial to us.

From a service that had been suffering through the years from inadequate development because of insufficient staff and funds, the school library was to undergo, under her direction, a vast change: the classroom that had earlier been formed from space taken from the library was returned to it, to become in part the work room/office at the north end; the quantity of reference material increased sharply; the lending area grew and in keeping with current trends film-strips and filed clippings became plentifully available to students and staff. In time, part-time help has made the library facilities ever more accessible, and students in increasing numbers have enjoyed the development. The library now is a tangible tribute to a teacher whose depth of library knowledge reflects her sense of organization, her directness of purpose, and her desire to foster learning through a love of books.

B.C.I.V.S. is losing in Miss Kelly's retirement one of its staunchest active supporters. Whatever was good for the school was to be done promptly and well. A lengthy day, crowded facilities, frazzled colleague or student all were part of her experience and each was coped with as an essential part of the school. In times past when clubs served the school in various ways, her Library Club was very active, and whatever funds were raised through its activities found their way back into the school's complexion as Commencement Awards, pictures for walls, or donations to worthy causes.

To Mr. Lewis Lambert - a Tribute



At the end of a career when a teacher can view in retrospect thirty-three years spent in our school and some four thousand young lives touched, he is entitled to pause in awesome reflection upon the impact he has had. No one is more capable of such a reflective pause than is Mr. Lambert who leaves our staff this year. And those of us whom he leaves behind welcome the opportunity to join ranks with the "four thousand" to reflect upon what the impact has been.

Where does one look to find another man as gentle as Mr. Lambert? His every fibre is soothed by his love of the good life, by the desire to perform in such a way as to mirror those things he cherishes. A musician of accomplishment, he felt at home with the students' bands and orchestras as he joined their ranks time after time. His gentleness of nature allowed him to understand the errors of tempo and harmony that would have jangled in the ears of a less sympathetic man.

But sympathy was among the traits that were admirable. He understood full well what it meant when a lad was timid and shy. In the din of machinery and the choking of dust he was ever watchful lest accident befall one of his charges, and on the rare occasions when it did he suffered the anguish of self-reproach, the pain of the misfortune and the fears of possible handicap for the unfortunate

This kind and gentle manner did not, however, allow a tolerance for shoddy workmanship or a tardy approach to duty. The demands he made were the demands to be met later on in an industrial world. Too few of us are still around to brag about knowing a man whose fondness for his craft is reminiscent of an earlier day. Mr. Lambert's knowledge and love of wood were painstakingly revealed in the quality of work produced by many a student and displayed for public pleasure at various display nights throughout the past.

For many whose personal acquaintance was neither as deep nor as lengthy as our own he may have appeared as an aloof man. Such was really not the case. The "aloofness" was really a requisite to view the ebb and flow of life from a safe distance, a necessary protection behind which he could enjoy those things which gave his own life so much meaning and enjoyment. He had developed the capacity to cut himself off from the dross of life about him, and from the wealth of his own selfsufficiency profit from a careful study of the musicians, artists, writers and thinkers of history, applying their messages to his own life and times.

From our midst then goes a man who in countless ways has enriched the school and the lives of those whom it has served. The gentle kind colleague, the skilled compassionate instructor, the gentleman, the musician, the scholar. It will be long years before we meet his like again.

Convinced, too, of the worth of the individual he was ever a passive threat to those whose priorities were less clear-cut than his own. Consider as well the tenacity with which he clung to his creeds, and you are viewing a man who was

The science department was his great delight. Ask any of the scores of students who clustered "deep and gentle and strong". about him regularly before and after the regular school day what it was that made the relationship so attractive; and the answer, "Mr. Shaver". Though he enjoyed success, his own and others', though he pushed hard and long for high achievement, though he scorned laziness and spurned indifference, his humanity ever shone through. The encouragement bestowed upon the lass who was worried and the solicitude for the lad who felt oppressed frequently gave fresh courage, sufficient to enkindle a desire to begin again and win. Even though his level of scholarship and competence was more than adequate, he could appreciate the attitude of those less enthusiastic than himself.

When a man's values are in order most other aspects of life are, also. The worries and cares of family life are not always easy to endure let alone overcome. 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
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
