A new atlas of Hastings County has hit the streets! The product of three years of work by Hastings County Historical Society President Orland French, the *Hastings County Heritage Atlas* is a colourful 260-page review celebrating the many and varied attributes of Ontario's second largest county.

At the Society's November meeting Orland doubled as guest speaker and presented his audience with an overview of the broad range of material the atlas covers. County history, geography and geology share space with over 70 maps, graphs and charts showing, among other things, the locations of cheese factories, rural post offices and mining operations. In



Orland French shows off the newest atlas of Hastings County.


size there are countries around the world that would fit into Hastings County with plenty of room left over!

Update from the Hastings Heritage Centre

2006 was another record-setting year. Our volunteers (aka the Archive Angels):

- hosted 42 workshops (up from 36 in 2005)
- presented "Treasures from the Archives" at the Annual Meeting in January
- held a successful open house for more than 25 visitors to mark Archives Awareness Week in April
- sponsored the second annual Canadian Confederation Centennial Checkers Challenge on Canada Day
- participated in Doors Open Belleville in September (for which we received an award from the Eastern Ontario Chapter of the Archives Association of Ontario)
- prepared 14 display panels relating to Belleville's railway history
- participated in the successful heritage day event sponsored by St. Theresa's Catholic Secondary School Renaissance Club (under the guidance of Joe Stafford)

Researchers continued to consult our resources in large numbers. More than 100 researchers visited the centre, including genealogists from as far away as British Columbia, Florida and Georgia. There were several requests for pictures, including three seeking permission to publish the photographs. In addition to assisting visitors, we responded to phone, letter and e-mail requests from 102 individuals.

Our collections continued to expand and some donations will be described in future *Outlooks*. Mary Jane Throop catalogued much of the new material and caught up with part of the backload.

We continued our policy of donating non-local materials from our collections to other archives and heritage facilities and items went to three such facilities.

We are pleased to report that the City added an airconditioning unit to the furnace and two dehumidifiers in the Great Hall, in an effort to improve storage conditions.

Thanks to all the Hastings Heritage Centre volunteers who spent so many hours in 2004 helping to preserve our county's history. We invite our members and friends of the Society to join us as we enter our 50th year. To help celebrate the anniversary, we are planning extended hours. More news later.

In addition to the welcome researchers and other guests, we do have some uninvited guests. We set a record this year for mice, voles and bats. Compare the figures for 2005 and 2006:

Once again, we are please to report that there was no damage to any archival material. Traps are checked on an almost daily basis. In addition, insect traps have been installed and, to further protect our archival materials, a humidifier (in winter) and dehumidifier (in summer) are well maintained. Despite these measures, it is impossible to meet modern archival standards in this building and we continue to look forward to a new facility.
