
or in any way interfering with the judges in the discharge of their duties, shall be disqualified from receiving any premium money.

- 13. No person shall be allowed to enter for exhibition more than one specimen in any section. This rule not to apply to animals.
- 14. Admittance to the grounds 25 cents; single carriage, 10 cents; double, 15 cents; grand stand 15 cents. No one admitted to the grounds or building on Tuesday and Wednesday, except members and judges, unless they purchase tickets from the gatekeeper.
- 15. Members will be charged 10 cents for each ticket given on the morning of the show.
- 16. Each member taking any prize must leave \$1.00 with the Treasurer for membership for 1911.
- 17. No tents or booths for the sale of intoxicating liquors will be allowed within or near the show grounds.
- 18. Manufacturers or agents of all implements, machinery, or musical instruments not enumerated shall have the liberty to exhibit on the grounds and in the hall of the Society by becoming members.
- 19. The judges are kindly requested to be in attendance at 1 o'clock p.m. on Tuesday, September 13, in order to complete as far as possible the judging during the first afternoon of the fair. If only two judges in any class are present they will be expected to proceed with the judging.
- 20. Parties aggrieved must notify the Secretary, in writing, of such complaint previous to 5 p.m. on Wednesday, September 14.
- 21. Members are requested to pay strict attention to all rules, as they will be adhered to by the officers of the Society.
- 22. On September 17, at 1 o'clock p.m., a meeting of the directors will be held at the Secretary's office, Front Street, Belleville, to adjust all complaints, if any.
- 23. Any premium not called for before December 31, 1910, will be forfeited to the Society.
- 24. While the directors will take every possible precaution under the circumstances to secure the safety of articles sent to the exhibition, the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting, and should any article be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, the directors will give all the assistance in their power towards the recovery, but they will not make any payment for the value thereof.






