### Glanmore Goes All Out For Canada's Birthday

It was a splashy affair on one of Belleville's best front lawns.

Glanmore, the Hastings County Museum, broke out the bunting and put on a Canada 125 neighbourhood party with a Victorian flair Sunday as the neighbours strolled over for iced tea, sandwiches, music and fun to help mark Canada's 125th birthday.

For the youngsters there were traditional games such as barrel stave rolling, stilts, croquet and bean bag tossing. For the adults, lawn chairs strategically placed under Glanmore's stately maples and

pines gave a shady vantage point for a musical, patriotic afternoon of honest-to-goodness, flag-waving.

Politicians, including Mayor Shirley Langer, MPPs Hugh O'Neil (Quinte) and Paul Johnson (Prince Edward-Lennox-South Hastings), Prince Edward-Hastings MP Lyle Vanclief, Hastings Warden Owen Ketcheson and Hastings-Frontenac-Lennox and Addington MP Bill Vankoughnet spoke briefly on the importance of the day, but the success of the day was the feel of the place.

"What a wonderful setting for Belleville to celebrate this

great country's birthday," remarked master of ceremonies, former MP Jack Ellis, togged out as pioneer city founder Capt. John Meyers.





This road connected Lake Ontario to the Bay of Quinte, and is presumed to be the oldest road in Ontario.

### Heritage Belleville Celebrates "CANADA 125"

Heritage Belleville, the Local Architectural Conservation Advisory Committee (LACAC) is distributing 'Canada 125' signs to over 200 homes and businesses which are at least 200 years old. Geny Boyce is Co-chairman of this city committee.



HISTORY WAS MADE this summer. The weather set records ... so very few days with the temperature reaching 30 degrees celsius and so very many wet weekends. Can any reader recall a similar summer?

THE TWEED CENOTAPH has been refurbished and rebuilt. The new base is inscribed with Tweed's Honour Roll and Royal Canadian Legion Branch 428 placed a time capsule inside. Capsule contents included council minutes and a copy of a letter written in 1889 by prominent merchant/politician Billa Flint. He described a great fire in Actinolite: 24 buildings burned, at a loss of \$40,000.

THE HASTINGS-PRINCE EDWARD LAND SURVEY-ORS ASSOCIATION has funded a time capsule and commemorative statue to salute the centennial of the Association of Ontario Land Surveyors. Created by local sculptor Jim Smith of Campbell Monuments, the statue (at the corner of Sidney and Dundas streets, Belleville), is black granite. Bancroft surveyor Mike McAlpine was the model for the statue.

EVAN MORTON's "Heritage Herald" column in *The Tweed News* continues to record donations to the Heritage Centre, including books by local authors and a large coloured 1898 map of Hastings and Prince Edward counties, published by the *Belleville Sun*. This may be one of the maps (sold in the 1960s by

our Society) after a bundle was found in a vault at Shire Hall, prior to its demolition when the present court house was built. Evan wonders if readers can shed light on the community of Glen Lewis, the "Proposed Moira Valley Route" for a railway linking Tweed to Belleville, the proposed Toronto and Ottawa Railway, and some abbreviations. What did "BSS" at Bogart represent? And "RSS" at Chapman's? Did they indicate a Roman Catholic Separate School? In some parts of Ontario there were Protestant Separate Schools. THE NEW ALGONQUIN PROVINCIAL PARK LOG-GING MUSEUM was officially opened on August 15. The one million dollar complex includes a 1.2 kilometre walking trail with 14 exhibit pods. Hats off to the Ministry of Natural Resources, the Friends of Algonquin Park, and the Algonquin Forestry Authority.

BETTY WOOD highlights historical scenes in *The Madoc Review*. Recent buildings included the Champion Cheese Factory and the Queensborough Methodist Church (built for \$1,000 in 1872 and closed in 1921).

WATCH FOR THIS FALL'S BOOK LAUNCH of Ontario's First Gold Rush: Eldorado, the 160-page story of the gold excitement in the Madoc-Eldorado area by this writer. A super Christmas gift.

CORNERS **HAZZARDS** CHURCH northeast of Madoc recently celebrated its 135th anniversary and dedicated the event to the memory of the late ALMA MOORCROFT, a local naturalist, historian, and the driving force behind the preservation of Hazzards Corners Church as an historic site. She was the co-author of Pilgrimage of Faith, a history of Madoc area churches. We join her family and many friends in remembering her contribution to heritage.

OUR SYMPATHY also to the family of the late Helen Hutchison. A former president of the Lennox and Addington Historical Society and the mover behind the movement to save the Macpherson House at Napanee, Helen was a strong supporter of the Loyalist Parkway and regional heritage groups, including our own.

DISTRESSING NEWS of cemetery vandalism. Thirty stones at the Marmora Protestant Cemetery were knocked over on August 10. Friends of Heritage and neighbours of cemeteries should act as 'Neighbourhood Watch' groups to protect them.

MEMBERS OF THE STIRLING HISTORICAL SOCIETY were delighted with the response to the August walking tour of Stirling's east end, sponsored by the Quinte Region Branch of the Architectural Conservancy of Ontario. To quote Lewis Zandbergen: "Over 80 people of all ages braved the elements to ogle,

gawk and ask questions about elegant brick houses on Edward Street, the 103-year-old hardware business of Jim/Mary Lindsay, and the ongoing restoration of Stirling's landmark Grand Trunk/CN station.

FAMILY DAY AT THE O'HARA MILL complex near Madoc was one of the best ever. The event spotlighted the official unveiling of a plaque denoting that the original waterpowered mill was a major boon to early settlers. Participants included ALISON KUGLIN (a family member and strong promoter of the mill complex for many years), the Hon. Elmer Buchanan, O'Hara Mill Board Chairman Tom Stephens, MRCA Chair Grace McKeown, and Madoc Two. Reeve Gerald Reid. The province has promised \$26,000 towards mill restoration and the board has set out to raise an additional \$50,000.

### **ANOTHER BIRTHDAY**

August 3, 1992 was the 200th anniversary of the landing at Nilagara-on-the-Lake of John Graves Simcoe, the first lieutenant-governor of Upper Canada. According to a Toronto Star article of the above date, he was

"...responsible for estab-

lishing a benevolent British rule that formed the basis for Canada's self-governing, Confederation and eventual independence from Britain...


...The first of Simcoe's administrative steps in Upper Canada was to establish an elected representative assem-

bly: the sort of body demanded by 'the rebels' meeting in Philadelphia in 1776...

...He established English weights and measures, district courts, civil magistrates and provisions for collecting small debts - all rights of Englishmen that had been demanded by American colonists when they rebelled

against the English parliament 20 years earlier...

...In retrospect, Canadians should be able to recognize that Simcoe secured the country from invasion from within as well as from rebellion from within."



## The Hastings County Museum requires a variety of volunteers to provide community assistance through our museum programmes.
